- 1 In principle, industrial categories in this booklet follow the categories of the Japan Standard Industry Classification (JSIC) (12th edition), excluding those industries otherwise noted. Those industries classified in accordance with the 11th revision are denoted with “former industrial classification.”
- 2 As a general rule, data taken from statistical surveys on business establishments and corporations has been provided by private business establishments unless denoted otherwise.
- 3 The organization names noted as sources for data in this booklet are the names of the organizations at the time of the date release.
- 4 Unless otherwise noted, all figures in the graph apply to Tokyo.
- 5 Japan's Fiscal Year begins on April 1 and concludes on March 31 of the following year.
